Jesus uses the parable of a vineyard owner. Salvation is offered to all. The chosen who reject Christ are really turning him over to the whole world. The vineyard will be leased to others. The kingdom of God will produce fruit.

The parable of the wicked tenants is perfect for this Sunday as we focus on the theme of respect for life. The wicked tenants of the vineyard had none for the master's servants, or even for his son. Our faith tells us that all human life is sacred from conception to death. That means we protect the unborn child, the newborn child vulnerable youth and adults, the elderly, the prisoner, and those with special needs. We make no exception! And that is the most difficult part. In the parable the tenants only look out for themselves. We must care for all!

"Lord Jesus, you came so that all might have life and have it more abundantly."

Make distractions a plus in prayer. There is no better way to build a relationship with Jesus than through prayer. St. Francis de Sales said, "When your mind wanders or gives way to distractions, gently recall it and place it once more close to its Divine Master. If you should do nothing else but repeat this during the whole time of prayer, your hour would be very well spent and you would perform a spiritual exercise most acceptable to God."

The month of October is dedicated to the most Holy Rosary and human life. The rosary is a beautiful prayer that helps us meditate on the life of Jesus. I encourage you to pray the rosary as a family, especially during this month.

We heighten our awareness of how sacred human life is from the moment of conception to death. We live in a society that in many ways supports a culture of death, but the Gospel is clear in calling each of us to promote a culture of life.

During war he was captured as a prisoner of war and held for ransom which his father paid after nearly a year of imprisonment. During his imprisonment St. Francis began receiving visions telling him to build God's church. After his release from prison he abandoned his life of luxury to spread the word of God. St. Francis is known for his compassion and for his deep connection to all beings particularly the animal kingdom. During his lifetime he cared for the sick and the poor. St. Francis traveled the country side delivering sermons

to humans and to animals. He believed all creatures were his brothers and sisters under God. St. Francis is the patron saint of animals and the environment. St. Francis of Assisi was the founder of the Franciscan order and was loved for his simple lifestyle. Pope Francis took his name on becoming pope.

The local people are very dependent on the crops they grow to provide a living for their families. Having the well totally paid for will allow the monastery to use their funds to help the local people in a variety of other ways. An Overview of Domestic Violence


Domestic violence is any kind of behavior that a person uses to control an intimate partner through fear and intimidation. It includes physical, sexual, psychological, verbal, and economic abuse. Some examples of domestic abuse include battering, name-calling and insults, threats to kill or harm one's partner or children, destruction of property, marital rape, and forced sterilization or abortion.⁸

Domestic violence is often shrouded in silence. People outside the family hesitate to interfere, even when they suspect abuse is occurring. Many times even extended family denies that abuse exists, out of loyalty to the abuser and in order to protect the image of the family. Some people still argue—mistakenly—that intervention by outside sources endangers the sanctity of the home. Yet abuse and assault are no less serious when they occur within a family. Even when domestic violence is reported, sometimes there are failures to protect victims adequately or to punish perpetrators.

- 1. What is Domestic Abuse and Violence. Domestic abuse and violence is any kind of behavior that a person uses to control an intimate partner through fear and intimidation. It includes physical, sexual psychological, verbal, and economic abuse. Some examples of domestic abuse include battering, name-calling and insults, threats to kill or harm one's partner or children, destruction of property, marital rape and forced sterilization or abortion.
- 2. **Domestic violence is not just a woman's issue**. Domestic Violence is: *an issue which affects our families * a health care issue *an issue whick affects the workplace, * an issue which affects our first responders.
- 3. What is the Church's response to Domestic Abuse? A correct reading os scripture leads to an understanding of the equal dignity of men and women and to relationships based on mutuality and love. *Husbands should love their wives as they love their own body, as Christ loves the Church. *Forgiveness does not mean forgetting the abuse or pretending it did not happen. Forgiveness is not permission to repeat the abuse. *An abuse woment's suffering is not punishment from God. This image of a harsh, cruel God runs contrary to the biblical image of a kind and merciful, loving God.. *No person is expected to stay in an abusive marriage. - 4. What are some Awaareness Prevention Resources? Life Matters: Domestic Violence by Frank J Moncher, PhD. Persons experiencing domestic violence are termed "victim" or if the situation has resolved, "survivors,", tu it is most important to recall they are children of God, with dignity and deserving our love and respect."
- 5. What do we need to know about Teen Datin Abuse and Violence? Young people are the future of our church and country. Let us help them find a better way and enter their adulthood without the burden of violence but full of peace, self-confidence and living their faith.
