The long-standing Christian practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving are also important elements of this spiritual battle. When we pray, we open ourselves to the Holy Spirit thereby squeezing out any spirit of selfishness or evil that threatens to control our hearts. When we fast, we exercise the virtue of temperance, or self-control. This virtue is of tremendous value when we are tempted to indulge our bodily senses in ways that are not healthy or holy. And almsgiving – when it is truly generous – also strengthens us spiritually by shifting our gaze to the needs of others, even to the point of making a personal sacrifice. **During Lent, we acknowledge the battle between good and evil within our own souls and do what we can to stir up a victory for goodness.** This season of purification can help each of us to become a better, holier, and therefore happier person. May we make good use of this, our journey into the desert.

**THE LENTEN FAST AND ABSTINENCE REQUIREMENTS:** Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics. In addition, Fridays during Lent are obligatory days of abstinence from meat. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. The norms concerning abstinence from meat are obligatory for members of the Catholic Church from age 14 onwards and the norms on fasting from age 18 until age 59.

**BREAKFAST TO BENEFIT MN FOODSHARE.** The Social Concerns committee will be hosting a breakfast on Sunday, March 7, 2021 following the 8:30 am Mass at St. Francis. It will be a free will offering to benefit the foodshare in Sibley County. It is their 40th year and in an effort to improve food insecurity in our area, they want you to know that your contribution is needed. Food or money. The Minnesota Charitable Food System (food shelves, and food banks, meal programs, etc) have been running at full capacity. The Covid-19 pandemic has exacerbated this, making it critical to focus on creating a more just and equitable food system that meets the needs of all Minnesotans.

Food insecurity means access to adequate food is inconsistent and limited by a lack of money and other resources throughout the year. Food insecure households report their diets to be of reduced quality, variety, or desirability and/or experience disrupted eating patterns and reduced food intake. The Charitable Food System wants to have nourishing food, regardless of race, socioeconomic class, location, gender and other social identities.

For the 2020 FoodShare drive, Sibley County collected 7,003 pounds of food and \$30,165. This is well below our neighboring counties of McLeod, Nicollet and Brown!

### SPIRITUALITY By Marianne Schotzko

### LOOKING FOWARD TO RENEWAL

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent in the Western Christian calendar. It occurs exactly 46 days before Easter (40 fasting days not counting Sundays). It is a moveable fast that can fall as early as February 4 and as late as March 10. This year (2021), Ash Wednesday is February 17th.

Ash Wednesday is named after the practice of placing ashes on the foreheads of faithful as a reminder of human mortality, and as a sign of mourning and repentance to God. Ash Wednesday is observed by most Christians. In the Catholic Church, Ash Wednesday is observed by fasting and abstinence from meat. The ash is to come from the palm trees dedicated on Palm Sunday of the previous year.

The primary purpose of Lent is to help us become truly holy – and we should work toward this goal during Lent by extra prayer, penance, good works, almsgiving, attendance at Mass and reception of the sacraments (the chief sources of grace). Traditionally, Catholics have chosen penitential practices for the whole time of Lent. These practices are disciplinary in nature and often more effective if they are continuous (kept on Sundays as well). These practices are not regulated by the Church, but by individual conscience.

Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat. On the Fridays of Lent, we remember the sacrifice of Christ on Good Friday and unite ourselves with that sacrifice through abstinence and prayer. The abstinence laws consider that meat comes only from animals such as chickens, cows, sheep or pigs – all of which live on land. Birds are also considered meat. Abstinence does not include meat juices and liquid foods made from meat. Thus, such foods as chicken broth, consommé, soups cooked or flavored with meat, meat gravies or sauces, as well as seasonings or condiments made from animal fat are technically not forbidden. However, moral theologians have traditionally taught that we should abstain from all animal-derived products (except foods such as gelatin, butter, cheese and eggs, which do not have any meat taste). Fish are a different category of animal. Salt and freshwater species of fish, amphibians, reptiles, (cold-blooded animals) and shellfish are permitted.

Days of Fast: Only one full meal is permitted on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday for Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59. Two smaller meals are permitted, but the small meals should not equal a second full meal. Drinking liquids between meals is allowed. Snacks or solid foods between meals are not allowed.

Some Lenten suggestions:

Begin each morning with the prayer: "Lord, I offer you this day, and all that I think, and do, and say." Attend Holy Mass as often as possible

Pray the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary Make the Stations of the Cross at home or in a parish celebration Read Scripture for 10 minutes every day Make a humble and sorrowful confession Read a traditional Catholic book Make time for heart felt prayer Disconnect from social media and News Fast by eating healthy and as a family Forgive and Pray for those who have hurt you Pray the Seven Penitential Psalms (Psalm 6, 31, 50, 101, 129 and 142) Spend some time in quiet prayer before the Blessed Sacrament Abstain from meat for an extra day or two each week Listen to spiritual music or a spiritual speaker Or any other practice that will help your spiritual renewal.

On Ash Wednesday, all over the world, Catholics are going to be praying and fasting. It is a powerful day to ask for God's forgiveness and for the salvation of Souls. All of us Catholics need to pray for unity and purity of Catholic dogma. We also want to repent of individual and collective sins that are destroying the Mystical Body of Christ. We should not take the Salvation of the World on OUR shoulders! **Jesus is the savior of the world**. We are just to help those with whom we have influence. Salvation starts with our own souls and our family. Every time we get depressed about the pope, bishops, priests, religious and laity, get down on our knees and pray about it. Then give it over to God, Mary and the Saints to take care of it. We only do whatever we can to peacefully reform and renew the Church. Then we let God do the rest. We are not God. Invite people this lent to attend mass. Chill out and have more joy. God is still in charge of the Church and the world. We are only His humble servants.
